Sending you pictures of "our" (Sisters of Charity and M.A.R.S.) new goat family in TiMache thanks to your grant. We also bought two male goats to keep those female goats busy so we can bring more families into the program. This is the "Pay it Forward" Goat Project at the School at Cuvier. The goat project entails giving a goat or two to a needy family in order to raise a herd to use for food or to sell if money is needed. The first offspring is given back to the ministry

From the garden project, the school gets something from the garden every day to feed to the children – spinach, okra, peppers, corn, or beans. Sometimes there is even a little extra to sell in the market.

ZIMBABWE-SIM For Freedom and Windows of Hope Covid Anti-trafficking Prevention Project' Community Garden

Karine Woldhuis reports that the new project in Zimbabwe to provide security, safety and protection to a vulnerable community in Eastern Zimbabwe by providing a community garden is well under way. The garden will provide food and water to a community that is currently experiencing great food scarcity and insecurity. And as a result, the community will be less likely to be targeted by human traffickers. Up to 100 families with an average of five per family will benefit from this project. The borehole was drilled and successfully found water ("abundant water") and is sufficient for the community garden and domestic use. Children who currently are needed for water and food gathering will now be able to attend school. A solar panel pump was installed. The garden fencing was built. Allotments have been given to all members of the community garden initiative. Water tanks have been built for water storage. Preparation of the ground is underway and seeds are being sourced from what the community has available. The garden members have worked really hard in preparing the garden, constructing the fencing, organizing allotments, and constructing water tank storage. The initiative sits under the local church and is well endorsed by local leaders.
